
The Athenaeum 1864-1877

Advertisements, Previews and Reviews



The Athenaeum was constructed in 1840 by James Marshall EMERSON and James Crider. It was located on the second floor of a building constructed in 1833 by John G. SHIELDS and J. Hannibal EMERSON who used the lower story as a store. The theater had a single balcony and only two box seats located so close to the stage that it was impossible to see well from either. The seating arrangement was unique. The rows of seats followed around the parquet

rail so that a person sitting on the extreme ends of the rows faced a side wall instead of the stage. In 1846 the building was renovated, enlarged, and called the CITY HOTEL by Richard Plumbe. In 1856 the proprietor was C. C. Hewitt.

In 1859, the City Hotel was redecorated and renamed the Peosta House. The name was changed twice within the next three years - Peosta Hall and Our New Hall. William G. STEWART purchased the building and began converting the Hall into Dubuque's fifth major theater in 1863.

In 1864 the Athenaeum Theater was reopened. The following pages document all the advertised performances at the Athenaeum from 1864 through June 30, 1877. By then the theater had become dilapidated and the owner of the building not seeing profit in the undertaking, refused to repair it, or change it into a decent hall. It was sold in October 1877 to Eighmey & Waller and, after considerable expense, it became the Duncan-Waller Opera House as described in another document.

Researching the performance history of the facility was complicated by the spelling used in advertising the building. At times it was Athenaeum. Other times it was the Athenaeum and on at least one occasion, The Athenaum.

I have also included occasional advertisements for other public attractions, including circus and concert attractions.

The Black Crook is a work of musical theatre first produced, with great success, in New York in 1866. Many theatre writers have identified The Black Crook as the first popular piece that conforms to the modern notion of a musical, while others regard this conclusion "as something of a joke". The book is by Charles M. Barras (1826–1873). The music, selected and arranged by Thomas Baker, consists mostly of adaptations, but it included some new songs composed for the piece, notably "You Naughty, Naughty Men". The story is a Faustian melodramatic romantic comedy, but the production became famous for its spectacular special effects and skimpy costumes.

"HAPPY" CAL, WAGNER was not born with that handle to his name, but just plain Calvin Wagner.

Mr. Wagner began comicalities at the age of 17, and at 70 is still "happy." Of course he played other minstrel engagements before appearing with Charley Morris' Company in 1864.

In 1865 he was with Sam Sharpley's Ironclads, and the following year Wagner and (Sam) Hague's Minstrels could readily be seen-if you had the price.

In 1867, January 21, to be exact, he joined Lloyd and Bidaux' Minstrels; the following year found him with Fred Wilson's Minstrels, and on March 6, 1869, he left Wilson in St. Louis; that is, he left Wilson's company. It was getting time for "Happy" Cal Wagner's Minstrels, and accordingly that organization soon sprang into being.

In the Fall of 1870 this company came under the able direction of "Jack" Haverly; the partnership was dissolved November 8, 1873. Mr. Wagner's Minstrels went on touring.

"Rip Van Winkle" is another play that received frequent performances in Dubuque during the late 1800s. William Joseph Jefferson was considered one of the finest actors of the era. He first appeared in Dubugue as a member of his father's troupe, the 14-member MacKenzie-Jefferson Theatrical Company from Chicago. He was just 10 years old in 1839 when the ensemble crossed the ice-covered Mississippi by sleigh on a mild winter day. In Joseph Jefferson's autobiography, he wrote: "As we crossed the river, we could periodically hear ominous rumbles from the ice, but we arrived safely. The baggage sleigh containing all costumes, scenery, and props broke through and became thoroughly soaked." All those items were hung in the hallways

and the cast's room at the City Hotel, 4^{th} & Main. He was the third actor of this name in a family of actors and managers, one of the most famous of all 19th century American comedians.





Jesse Shepard (1848-1927) was an outstanding musical performer who attributed his gifts to mediumship, and whose popularity with audiences in high society has led him to be compared with the medium DD Home, although he did not offer to relay messages from the dead. Like Home, Shepard did not charge for his performances, nor did he publish the works he performed. In later life, he won critical acclaim as an essayist under the pen name Francis Grierson. By his own account, at the

age of 21, while attending a theatre performance in St Louis, a spirit called 'Rachel' came to him with advice to develop his singing. Accordingly, he visited a music professor who was impressed by the power of his voice and arranged for him to sing to an audience, which received his performance warmly.

Shepard then travelled to Paris, where his exceptional talents found wealthy patrons; his performances were in demand in high society. In 1871 he travelled to St Petersburg, where he played for the Czar. He returned to the US in 1874 and two years later performed at an old mission in San Diego. He later made his home there, building a grand mansion, the Villa Montezuma.

In the early 1880s, he travelled to London, Berlin and Australia. Audiences were amazed to hear him apparently sing soprano and bass parts simultaneously. During a séance in Chicago the daughter of the medium Hudson Tuttle claimed that his spirit control sang one part while an Egyptian spirit sang the other.

His ability on the piano was considered even more awe inspiring: he seemed to some to be have been variously possessed by the spirits of Mozart, Beethoven, Meyerbeer, Rossini, Sontag, Persiani, Malibran, Lablache, Liszt, Berlioz, and Chopin.

In 1885, Shepard met Lawrence W Tonner, who became Shepard's secretary and friend for over forty years. He continued writing and gave occasional piano recitals. He died at the keyboard while playing at a benefit dinner given for him on 29 May 1927.



THE NEW OPERA HOUSE. An Item.Concerning Some of Its Decorations.

The new opera house is nearly completed, and our citizens will be astonished at its agnificence, its appointments, its admirable seats, its ventilation, its numerous avenues of egress in case of accident, its model besting apparatus, its large stage, elegant scenery and brilliant attachments. But the sinc qua non of its attractiveness is the artistic work displayed upon its walls. One would scarcely imagine that human genius could so shape the surface of rough mortar as to present a sea of beauty rivaling that described by Cevantes, whose mind pernested the gorgeous palaces of the genii. Under the master hands of Schubert & Keenig, of Chicago, the dome and walls of the new opera house have been transformed into the most pleasing and beautiful scenes. which, especially at night, are "dazzlingly magnificent."

Messrs. Eighney and Waller proposed to make the opera house one of the most handsome and convenient public halls in the west, and for that purpose employed the most noted artists that could be procured, and consequently engaged Messrs. Schubert & Kenir to execute the frescoing, and they have performed their task most magnificently. The dome or ceiling is undoubtedly the most handsome frescoing in the west, and the designs are admirably conceived. The center, encirvling the dome lights, is wreathed with flowers that look as natural as life-as though Flora, glorified at the genial December weather, had sent her the genual December weather, had sent her favorite fairies to decorate the gorgeous Taespian temple. The pannelling and or-naments are beautifully blended, and re-semble the chef-d'ouvere of art, dancing upon the sunset clouds, minelling with the variegated thats of the rambow. Just over the stans to a form of Newhoren adults. the stage is a figure of Shakspeare, admiradraws and painted, white on left the drama is represent-by a figure of Thespla, and at the right Music is honored by a figure of Euterpe. Messrs. Schubert & Koenig have not forzotten the muses, which they represent by likenesses of Melpomene, Thalia. Erato and Clio, all resting in niches surrounded by diversified ornamentation. In short, Messrs. Schubert & Koenig have added greatly to their reputation as fresco artists, and we hope their deft fingers will be employed upon other of Dubuque's publie buildings, and famous residences. Their work on the new opera house is simply magnificent. They have converted the cold. gray walls into golden clouds and messengers of day.
